What exactly is Democracy? Is it simply having the right to vote? Or, is it working to treat those who are marginalized as we treat ourselves? Maybe it's freedom from oppression? Or could it be ... dismantling the political, economic and societal systems currently in place (systems that serve the few, not the many), and creating a level playing field?

Democracy may contain these elements, but that isn't what DEMOCRACY IS. I looked at a wide variety of definitions (including Merriam Webster and The Urban Dictionary) and not a single description encompassed what I believe democracy is.

So, I am turning to poetry. These two poems, written by Langston Hughes, carry in their words the essence of what democracy, or the lack of it, means to me. It is a promise unfulfilled. It can be nebulous. It is shaped by our personal backgrounds and life experiences. Democracy is one of those things that is extremely hard to define ... but you know it best, you feel it in your bones - when you do not have it.

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The President Speaks

Striving for democracy is a hallmark of Unitarian Universalism, reflected in our 5th Principle: The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. At General Assembly this summer, a powerful Statement of Conscience, "Our Democracy Uncorrupted" was adopted. See the UU World Fall 2019 Issue. I urge you to read the full text at <https://www.uua.org/action/statements/our-democracy-uncorrupted>.

With this in mind, think about what privileges or resources you might have. What are ways you can create and support equity and increase inclusive participation? Consider how you might participate at UUFCC and beyond, one-time to ongoing.

Looking to broader efforts with local and statewide UU involvement, here are a couple of the groups working toward building a real, inclusive democracy: Nonpartisan Fair Districts PA, at fairdistrictspa.com, raises awareness of the need for redistricting reform and works to end gerrymandering. UUPlan (UU Pennsylvania Legislative Advocacy Network) at uuplan.org, is a coalition of UU congregations working on seven key issues: criminal justice reform, economic justice, environmental justice, good government, gun violence prevention, immigration justice and reproductive justice.

Collective work is crucial, as is individual work. So I encourage you to tune in to upcoming elections, get informed and VOTE. In Centre County, October 7 is the last day to register to vote in the November 5 elections.

Lighter-hearted democracy-in-action comes soon: the UUFCC Chili Cook-off is November 3, just after the morning service and before the midyear meeting. At the Chili Cook-off, thanks to the work of the RE Committee and many helpers and cooks, the congregation is able to sample and vote for our favorite homemade chilies.

Afterwards, it's on to the midyear meeting. The midyear meeting is a time to help shape and support the Fellowship together. We gather to hear and discuss important updates, and members vote on items such as the rest of this year's First Sunday Plate Collections and the proposed nominating committee. The nominating committee will bring forward the slate of Board trustees at the next annual meeting in late Spring 2020. Then open trustee positions will be President-Elect (four-year term with two as President-Elect and two as President), Secretary (two-year term), and one trustee at large (three-year term). So please join in!

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News from the Worship Committee

Happy Fall! There are a few changes brewing in Worship we'd like to communicate to you.

For starters, you may have noticed that we no longer list an end time for services. There are a couple of reasons why. First, some services, like Water Communion and RE Sunday, just can't be contained into a 60-minute time slot. These services are a celebration of our community, and we're grateful to have the time together. The second reason is the unpredictable nature of worship. When we have Joys & Sorrows, or when children are in, there are factors outside the control of even the most time-conscious worship leader. And while these service elements may take some extra time, we believe that it is time well spent, as these are ways we build community with one another. We do our best to make sure services last approximately one hour, and we implore you to keep an open heart and an open mind when services run a few minutes past 11:00 a.m.

Rev. Carol introduced the exciting concept of theme-based ministry to us three years ago at our first Worship Committee Retreat. One way we're looking to expand this practice, aside from having a service each month on the theme, is to have a monthly discussion group. We'll provide a short article for you to read ahead of time, or you can just show up a few minutes early. The first Theme Cafe will be on Sunday, October 20, on October's theme: Democracy. We will meet at 9:00 a.m. in the library for fellowship and discussion around this timely topic. Stay tuned for more information. We hope to see you there!

Additionally, you may be wondering where Time for All Ages went. Worry not! We are still actively pursuing the goal of creating meaningful intergenerational worship, but this component of our services has gotten a little name-change and a makeover. Worship Committee

The Board Report

This column gives you a quick list of what the Board of Trustees worked on in our monthly meeting, and offers several points of information we'd like to share.

In September, the trustees:

- Approved an ad hoc committee to identify congregants willing to serve on this year's nominating committee.
- Voted to provide each UUFCC employee with a letter that reaffirms their employment, emphasizes that they still are employed "at will," and documents the details of their employment at the start of each fiscal year. This procedure will not apply to the minister (that procedure is covered in the bylaws) and will replace the annual employment contracts described in the current Personnel Policy Manual. UUFCC has consistently emphasized in the manual and past contracts that staff are employed "at will" for an unspecified period of time. Under Pennsylvania law, "at will" means that either the employer or employee may terminate the employment relationship at any time for any reason. The Fellowship's trustees recently learned that the UUA advises congregations to document "at will" arrangements with each employee at the start of every fiscal year with a letter, not a contract. A lawyer also advised providing annual letters to UUFCC employees.
- Learned that the UUFCC solar power application is not moving forward at this time. The PA Solar Center said that the combination of a small project (in solar developers' scale), mostly ground-mounted sites (higher expense), and lack of audited financials resulted in the solar developers not bidding on our project.
- Discussed strategic priorities, including ways to promote leadership development and fill vacant volunteer positions. The Board will initiate a workshop in November with the Program Council and others to discuss organizational aspects, including membership coordination, committee charters, and the status of the Operations/ Administrative Team (OAT).

Update from UUPennsylvania Legislative Advocacy Network

Democracy is not a Spectator Sport

Advocacy Day - Saturday, October 12

Morning Session:

Reading the PA Political Tea Leaves: Where do we go from here? Micah Sims of Common Cause PA, Rabbi Michael Pollack of March on Harrisburg and Carol Kuniholm of Fair Districts PA will present their views of the current situations in Harrisburg. It will be a robust conversation about moving legislation to reclaim our democracy.

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Social Action (continued)

Afternoon Session:

Opportunities for UUPLAN to Be Even More Effective: Our new Director of Legislative Affairs will describe “UUs Go to Harrisburg,” followed by a brainstorming session among UUPLAN justice teams. The way some other UU State Advocacy Networks do their work will be presented. Justice Team Leaders and attendees will have a chance to share their thoughts and ideas. Session ends with ice cream.

Gun Violence Prevention

“After a long, bloody summer of mass shootings, it is time for us to gather together monthly and discuss the gun violence epidemic that is getting increasing attention from the media and the public,” stated Tom Buglio, UUPlan Gun Violence Prevention leader, at a recent UUPlan meeting.

He said that advocates for gun violence protection are trying to decide how far to push legislatures: whether to go for very strong measures, such as mandatory gun licensing as suggested by Democratic presidential candidate Beto O’Rourke, or to push for priorities like Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPO), Universal Background Checks in Washington, and that which is possible with Republicans being in control of Harrisburg and the U.S. Senate.

Buglio, who is looking for input and participation in anti-gun activities said, “I am optimistic that the issue of gun violence is reaching a tipping point, and that real change is not far away.”

Other News:

- The NRA was declared a domestic terrorist organization by San Francisco City Council.
- The U.S. House passed three more Gun Violence Protection Bills on September 10.

Raise the Wage PA

Raise the Wage PA, a group that is supported by UUPlan, is a coalition of groups advocating for a minimum wage increase in Pennsylvania. They rented a small plane to circle over Beaver Stadium from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. before the Penn State/Pitt game on September 14. Its message read: “PA workers deserve a living wage! Text WAGE to 33339.”

The group is working to increase the minimum wage from its current \$7.25 an hour to \$12.00 an hour by July, 2020, and to \$15.00 per hour by 2025.

As well as delivering a high-flying message, about 50 volunteers canvassed at the Penn State library and the parking lots where people were tailgating. They handed out cards with information, and collected signatures to support the wage increase. Banners were also held up at the end zone.

In addition to the continuing efforts of Raise the Wage PA and its supporters, Governor Tom Wolf pledged “to keep fighting tooth and nail for a higher minimum wage.”
